Answer Key & Explanations

1. C - 75 mph

The maximum speed limit on rural interstate highways in Kansas is 75 mph. Always check posted signs, as limits can vary.

2. B - From sunset to sunrise and when visibility is less than 1,000 feet

Kansas law requires headlights from sunset to sunrise and any time when visibility conditions make it difficult to see persons or vehicles 1,000 feet ahead.

3. C - The driver on the right

When two vehicles reach an uncontrolled intersection at the same time, the driver on the LEFT must yield to the driver on the RIGHT.

4. C - 3-second rule

Kansas recommends the 3-second rule in good conditions. Choose a fixed point ahead, and when the car in front passes it, count 3 seconds. Increase distance in bad weather.

5. C - 0.02%

Kansas has a zero-tolerance policy for drivers under 21. A BAC of 0.02% or higher is considered driving under the influence for drivers under 21.

6. B - Stop completely

A red octagon (8-sided sign) always means STOP. You must come to a complete stop at the stop line, crosswalk, or before entering the intersection.

7. C - 15 feet

Kansas law prohibits parking within 15 feet of a fire hydrant. This distance ensures emergency vehicles can access the hydrant quickly.

8. B - Stop and wait until lights stop flashing

Kansas law requires all vehicles, in both directions on undivided roads, to stop when a school bus has red lights flashing and the stop arm is extended. You must remain stopped until the lights stop flashing.

9. B - Slow down and proceed with caution

A flashing yellow signal means slow down and proceed with caution. You do not need to stop, but you must be alert for cross traffic and pedestrians.

10. C - Triangular and red with white

A yield sign is triangular (inverted triangle) with a red border and white interior. It means slow down and give the right of way to traffic or pedestrians.

11. B - Low-beam headlights

In fog, use low-beam headlights. High beams reflect off fog and reduce visibility. Fog lights, if equipped, may also be used.

12. B - 100 feet

Kansas law requires drivers to signal at least 100 feet before making a turn or changing lanes in urban areas, and 200 feet in rural areas.

13. B - Traffic already on the highway

Traffic already on the highway has the right of way. When merging, you must yield and adjust your speed to safely enter the flow of traffic.

14. B - 90 days

A first DUI conviction in Kansas results in a 90-day license suspension for drivers 21 and older. Additional penalties include fines and possible jail time.

15. B - Pull over to the right and stop until it passes

You must immediately pull over to the right edge of the road and stop until the emergency vehicle has passed. This applies to all emergency vehicles.

16. C - 20 mph

The speed limit in Kansas school zones is 20 mph when children are present or the school zone flashers are operating. Always obey posted school zone signs.

17. C - Steer in the direction of the skid and ease off the accelerator

In a skid, steer in the direction the rear of the vehicle is skidding (into the skid) and ease off the gas. This helps straighten the vehicle. Avoid hard braking.

18. B - Passenger loading and unloading only

A white curb indicates a passenger loading and unloading zone only. Drivers may stop briefly to pick up or drop off passengers.

19. C - The first vehicle to arrive

At a four-way stop, the first vehicle to arrive goes first. If two vehicles arrive simultaneously, the driver on the LEFT must yield to the driver on the RIGHT.

20. A - Anyone is injured or killed, or property damage exceeds \$1,000

Kansas law requires you to report an accident to law enforcement if anyone is injured or killed, or if property damage appears to exceed \$1,000.

21. C - Rely only on your mirrors

Mirrors have blind spots. You should always turn your body to look directly through the rear window when backing up, not rely solely on mirrors.

22. B - Construction or work zone warning

Orange diamond-shaped signs indicate construction or work zones. Slow down, stay alert, and follow all posted directions in work zones. Fines are doubled.

23. B - Away from the curb (left)

When parking uphill with a curb, turn your wheels away from the curb (to the left). If the car rolls backward, the curb will stop it.

24. B - Passing is not allowed from either direction

Double solid yellow lines separate traffic moving in opposite directions. Neither driver may cross these lines to pass or turn left, except at designated openings.

25. C - 200 feet

Kansas law requires that a vehicle's horn be audible from a distance of at least 200 feet. Horns should only be used when necessary for safety.

26. C - Always, at both marked and unmarked crosswalks

Kansas law requires drivers to yield to pedestrians at both marked and unmarked crosswalks. An unmarked crosswalk exists at every intersection corner.

27. C - Pump the brakes, downshift, and use the emergency brake gradually

If brakes fail, pump the pedal to build pressure, downshift to slow the engine, then gradually apply the emergency/parking brake to slow the vehicle. Steer to safety.

28. C - \$60

Kansas prohibits handheld cell phone use while driving. The fine for the first offense is \$60, with higher fines for subsequent violations.

29. B - Go if the intersection is clear

A green light means go if the intersection is clear. You must still yield to emergency vehicles, pedestrians in crosswalks, and any remaining cross-traffic.

30. B - Wear a seat belt regardless of age

Kansas law requires all front-seat occupants to wear a seat belt at all times. All rear-seat passengers under 14 must also be buckled. Seat belts save lives.

31. B - No passing zone

A pennant-shaped (five-sided) yellow sign marks the beginning of a no-passing zone. It is posted on the left side of the road where passing is not permitted.

32. B - At the beginning of a rain shower

The most dangerous time is the beginning of rain. Oil and grease on the road surface mix with the first rain, creating very slippery conditions before being washed away.

33. C - Slow down and proceed with caution

The Kansas Move Over Law requires drivers to move over a lane when passing stopped emergency vehicles. If that is not possible, you must slow down significantly and pass with caution.

34. B - Oncoming traffic and pedestrians

When turning left, you must yield to all oncoming traffic and pedestrians in the crosswalk. Wait for a safe gap before completing your turn.

35. C - 30 mph

The default speed limit in Kansas residential districts is 30 mph unless a lower limit is posted. Always check for posted signs, which take precedence.

36. B - 50 feet

Kansas prohibits parking within 50 feet of the nearest rail of a railroad crossing. This ensures emergency vehicles and trains have clear sight lines.

37. B - Impairing judgment, vision, and reaction time

Alcohol impairs multiple driving functions simultaneously: judgment and decision-making, vision (especially peripheral), coordination, and reaction time.

38. C - Rain, snow, or other precipitation requires them for safe driving

Kansas law requires windshield wipers to be in good working order and used whenever rain, snow, or other precipitation affects visibility and safe driving.

39. B - Passing is permitted when safe

Broken (dashed) white lines separate traffic lanes going in the same direction. You may change lanes or pass when it is safe to do so.

40. C - Slow before the curve, maintain speed through it, then accelerate out

Slow down before entering a curve, maintain a steady speed through the curve, then gently accelerate as you exit. Braking in a curve can cause skidding.

41. C - 14 years old

In Kansas you can apply for a learner's permit at 14 after passing the DMV knowledge test and a vision screening.

42. C - 80%

The DMV requires 80% to pass - that is 20 of 25 questions correct.

43. B - Stop completely before the intersection

A red light means you must stop completely before the stop line, crosswalk, or before entering the intersection. You must remain stopped until the light turns green.

44. B - Stop if it is safe to do so

A yellow (amber) light means the signal is about to turn red. You should stop if it is safe to do so. Only proceed if stopping would be unsafe (e.g., you are too close to the intersection).

45. B - The driver must yield to the pedestrian

Drivers must always yield to pedestrians who are crossing in a marked or unmarked crosswalk. Pedestrian safety is the highest priority.

46. C - Octagon (8-sided)

Stop signs are always octagonal (8-sided) and red. This unique shape allows drivers to recognize them even when covered in snow or seen from behind.

47. C - 3-second rule

The 3-second rule is the minimum recommended following distance in good conditions. Pick a fixed point - when the car ahead passes it, count 3 seconds. Increase to 4-6 seconds in bad weather.

48. C - Yellow or orange

Warning signs are yellow (standard warnings) or orange (construction/work zones). They alert drivers to potential hazards ahead such as curves, intersections, or pedestrians.

49. B - The maximum legal speed under ideal conditions - you must drive slower when conditions require it

A prima facie speed limit is the legal maximum under ideal conditions. You must drive more slowly when weather, traffic, or road conditions make the posted limit unsafe.

50. B - 0.08%

In most US states, a BAC of 0.08% or higher is legally considered driving under the influence (DUI) for drivers 21 and older. Always check your state's specific laws.

51. B - The car on the right

When two vehicles arrive at a 4-way stop simultaneously, the driver on the LEFT must yield to the driver on the RIGHT. This is the standard right-of-way rule.

52. B - From sunset to sunrise and when visibility is reduced

Headlights are required from sunset to sunrise and any time when visibility is reduced to the point where persons or vehicles cannot be seen at 1,000 feet (distances vary by state).

53. B - Yield - slow down and give right of way

A yield sign is triangular with a red border and white background. It means slow down and give the right of way to traffic or pedestrians. Only stop if necessary.

54. C - Loading and unloading only (no parking)

A yellow curb marks a loading and unloading zone. Drivers may stop briefly to load or unload passengers or freight, but cannot park. Rules vary by location and time of day.

55. B - Pull to the right edge and stop

When an emergency vehicle approaches with lights or siren, you must immediately pull to the right edge of the road and stop. Remain stopped until the vehicle has passed.

56. B - A construction or work zone warning

Orange diamond-shaped signs indicate construction or work zones. Speed limits are often reduced and fines are doubled in work zones. Slow down and stay alert.

57. B - Use low-beam headlights and increase following distance

In rain, use low-beam headlights (high beams reflect off rain), reduce speed, and increase following distance to at least 4-6 seconds. High beams can reduce visibility in rain.

58. B - Just before the stop line

Stop before the stop line - not on it or beyond it. If there is no stop line, stop before the crosswalk. If no crosswalk, stop before the intersection.

59. C - Glance quickly over your shoulder in the direction of the lane change

Mirrors have blind spots. Always glance over your shoulder in the direction you plan to move before changing lanes, in addition to checking your mirrors.

60. B - At least 100 feet in advance (distance varies by state)

You must signal before turning or changing lanes - generally at least 100 feet in advance in urban areas and 200 feet in rural areas. Always signal regardless of whether other vehicles are visible.

61. B - Away from the curb (left)

When parking uphill with a curb, turn your wheels away from the curb (left). If the car rolls backward, it hits the curb and stops. Downhill: turn toward the curb.

62. C - Guide information (directions, distances)

Green signs provide guidance information such as highway route numbers, exit numbers, destinations, distances, and directions. They help drivers navigate.

63. B - Yield to oncoming traffic and pedestrians, then turn

A green ball (not arrow) allows a left turn only after yielding to oncoming traffic and pedestrians. A green arrow means you have a protected turn and oncoming traffic is stopped.

64. B - Treat it as a stop sign - stop and proceed when safe

A flashing red light must be treated exactly like a stop sign. Come to a complete stop, check for traffic and pedestrians, then proceed when safe.

65. B - Shift to neutral, apply brakes steadily, and steer to safety

Shift to neutral (to disconnect engine power), then apply brakes steadily to slow the vehicle. Steer to a safe location. Only turn off the ignition if other methods fail - as this can lock the steering column in older cars.

66. B - No passing from either direction

Double solid yellow lines separate traffic moving in opposite directions. Crossing them to pass is prohibited from both directions.

67. B - Impairing reaction time, judgment, coordination, and vision

Alcohol impairs all the skills needed to drive safely: reaction time slows, judgment and decision-making deteriorate, coordination suffers, and vision (especially peripheral) is reduced.

68. B - A yellow circle with a black X and RR

A railroad crossing advance warning sign is round and yellow with a black X and the letters RR. It warns that a railroad crossing is ahead.

69. C - Ease off the gas and steer in the direction you want to go

In a skid, take your foot off the gas (do not brake hard) and gently steer in the direction you want the front of the car to go. Smooth inputs are key - sudden movements worsen the skid.

70. C - 15 feet

In most states, parking within 15 feet of a fire hydrant is prohibited. This ensures fire trucks can access the hydrant quickly in an emergency.

71. B - Lane changes are permitted when safe

Broken (dashed) white lines separate lanes of traffic moving in the same direction. You may change lanes when it is safe to do so.

72. B - Whenever precipitation affects visibility and safe driving

Windshield wipers must be used whenever rain, snow, sleet, or other precipitation reduces visibility or makes safe driving difficult. Many states also require headlights when wipers are in use.

73. B - Traffic already on the highway

Traffic already on the highway has the right of way. The merging driver must adjust speed to safely enter the flow of traffic - do not force other drivers to slow down.

74. C - Services such as rest areas, gas, food, lodging

Blue signs provide information about motorist services: gas stations, food, lodging, hospitals, and rest areas. They help drivers find services along the route.

75. C - Ease off the gas and hold the wheel steady - do not brake hard

During hydroplaning, ease off the gas gradually to slow down. Hold the steering wheel firmly and straight. Do not brake suddenly or steer sharply - this can cause a spin.

76. C - 30 feet

In most states, parking within 30 feet of an intersection is prohibited. This keeps sightlines clear for drivers and pedestrians.

77. A - Move over one lane away from stopped emergency vehicles on the roadside; if impossible, slow down significantly

All 50 states have Move Over laws requiring drivers to move over at least one lane away from stopped emergency, police, and maintenance vehicles. If changing lanes is unsafe, slow to well below the speed limit.

78. B - Stop - in both directions on undivided roads - and wait until lights stop flashing

When a school bus displays flashing red lights and its stop arm is extended, ALL traffic in both directions must stop on undivided roads. On a divided highway, traffic going the opposite direction may proceed. Wait until the lights stop and the arm is retracted.

79. B - Yield to traffic already in the roundabout

When entering a roundabout, yield to all vehicles already circulating inside. Enter only when there is a safe gap in traffic. Drive counterclockwise around the circle.

80. B - To prevent wheels from locking up so you can steer while braking hard

ABS prevents wheels from locking during hard braking, allowing you to maintain steering control. When ABS activates, you may feel pulsing in the brake pedal - this is normal. Press firmly and steer.

81. B - School zones

Pentagon-shaped signs (pointing up or down) are used for school zones and school crossings. They are yellow-green in color and alert drivers that children may be present.

82. B - To express frustration at another driver

Horns are safety devices used to warn others of danger. Using your horn out of frustration or anger is not a legal use and can be considered aggressive driving in many states.

83. B - By driving on public roads, you automatically consent to chemical tests for alcohol/drugs if lawfully arrested

Implied consent laws mean that by driving on public roads, you have already consented to chemical tests (breath, blood, urine) if you are lawfully arrested for suspected DUI. Refusing has serious consequences including license suspension.

84. B - No stopping, standing, or parking at any time

A red curb means absolutely no stopping, standing, or parking at any time. It is typically a fire lane or location where stopping could create a hazard.

85. B - Monthly and before long trips, when tires are cold

Check tire pressure monthly and before long trips, using a gauge when tires are cold (not recently driven). Proper inflation improves fuel economy, tire life, and braking performance.

86. C - Take breaks every 2 hours or 100 miles

The only real cure for drowsiness while driving is sleep. Take breaks at least every 2 hours or 100 miles. Coffee provides temporary relief but is not a substitute for rest.

87. C - 88 feet

At 60 mph, a vehicle travels about 88 feet per second ($60 \times 5,280 \div 3,600 = 88$). Understanding stopping distances is critical - at 60 mph you need approximately 300 feet to stop.

88. B - Directly behind, directly in front, and on both sides near the cab

Large trucks have significant blind spots (no-zones): directly in front (20 feet), directly behind (30 feet), to the right (2 lanes wide), and to the left (1 lane). If you cannot see the driver's face in their mirror, they cannot see you.

89. B - Use both lanes until the merge point and alternate with other vehicles

The zipper merge is the safest and most efficient method. Use both lanes until the merge point, then alternate like a zipper. Studies show this reduces backups by up to 40% compared to early merging.

90. B - No passing zone begins

The no-passing zone pennant sign is yellow and five-sided, pointing to the right. It is posted on the left side of the road at the start of a no-passing zone where solid yellow lines appear on the road.

91. C - Illegal in most states and significantly increases crash risk

Handheld cell phone use while driving is banned in most US states. Using a phone quadruples crash risk. Even hands-free calls significantly impair attention. Use do-not-disturb mode when driving.

92. D - All of the above - only time removes alcohol from the body

Nothing speeds up alcohol metabolism. Coffee, food, and cold showers may make a person feel more alert but do not lower BAC. The liver processes about 0.015% BAC per hour. Only time works.

93. C - Vehicles on the terminating road

At a T-intersection (where one road ends and meets another), vehicles on the through road (the top of the T) have the right of way over vehicles on the terminating road (the bottom of the T).

94. A - Pull over immediately and turn on hazard lights

If your headlights fail at night, immediately activate your hazard lights, signal, and safely pull completely off the road. Do not continue driving without headlights as it is extremely dangerous and illegal.

95. C - A distance where stopping safely becomes impossible

The 'point of no return' is the position from which stopping safely (without running the light or causing a rear-end collision) becomes impossible. Before this point, slow and stop. After it, proceed through safely.

96. B - When your vehicle is stopped or disabled on the road due to an emergency

Hazard lights should be used when your vehicle is disabled or stopped in an emergency situation on the roadway. Using them while driving in rain or moving slowly can confuse other drivers about your intentions.

97. C - 18 inches

When parallel parking, you should park within 18 inches of the curb. This ensures your vehicle is not obstructing traffic and prevents others from hitting your protruding vehicle.

98. B - Ease off the gas, hold the wheel firmly, and steer back gently when speed has dropped

If your wheels drift onto the shoulder, do not brake hard or jerk the wheel. Ease off the accelerator, keep a firm grip, and steer back onto the pavement gently once your speed has decreased - this prevents loss of control.

99. B - Grip the wheel firmly and steer straight while easing off the gas

During a blowout, hold the steering wheel firmly to keep the vehicle straight, ease your foot off the accelerator, and let the car slow gradually. Hard braking can cause a spin. Pull off the road only after you have control.

100. C - Move over or increase your following distance to the car ahead and let them pass

When tailgated, do not brake-check. Move to another lane if possible or increase the gap to the vehicle ahead so you have more room to stop gradually - this gives both you and the tailgater more reaction time.

101. B - On open roads with no oncoming traffic or vehicles ahead

Use high beams on open roads when there is no oncoming traffic and no vehicle close ahead. Dim them within 500 feet of oncoming traffic and 200-300 feet when following. High beams reflect off fog, rain, and snow, reducing visibility.

102. B - Maintaining space and staying out of other vehicles' blind spots

Maintain a space cushion around your vehicle and avoid lingering in others' blind spots. This keeps you visible, gives you escape routes, and improves your view of developing hazards.

103. C - Many can cause drowsiness or impairment - always check the label and warnings

Many legal medications - including antihistamines, sleep aids, and pain relievers - can cause drowsiness, dizziness, or slowed reactions. Always read warning labels and avoid driving if a medication may impair you.

104. C - Only to make a turn, enter/exit a driveway, or park where permitted

Bike lanes are reserved for bicyclists. Motor vehicles may only enter them briefly to complete a turn, enter or leave a driveway, or park where parking is allowed - and must yield to cyclists first.

105. B - Resting your foot lightly over the brake pedal without pressing it, ready to stop

Covering the brake means moving your foot off the gas and holding it just above the brake pedal in situations where you may need to stop quickly - such as near intersections, schools, or playing children. It shortens reaction time.

106. B - Pull over, turn off the engine, get everyone out, and move far away

If your engine catches fire, pull off the road, shut off the engine, and get all occupants out and well away from the vehicle. Do NOT open the hood - adding oxygen can intensify the fire. Call 911.

107. B - Perception distance, reaction distance, and braking distance

Total stopping distance = perception distance (seeing the hazard) + reaction distance (moving your foot to the brake) + braking distance (the vehicle physically stopping). All three increase with speed, which is why higher speeds are far more dangerous.

108. B - Reduce speed and increase following distance because visibility is limited

At night your visibility is reduced, so reduce speed and increase following distance. Do not overdrive your headlights - be able to stop within the distance you can see. Avoid staring at oncoming lights; glance to the right edge of your lane.

109. B - Stop, then proceed when safe - the cross traffic does not have to stop

A flashing red light works like a stop sign: stop completely, then go when safe. The cross traffic with a flashing yellow only needs to slow and proceed with caution - they do not stop, so you must yield to them.

110. B - Lane changes are discouraged - stay in your lane

A solid white line discourages or prohibits lane changes. A broken (dashed) white line means lane changes are permitted when safe. White lines separate traffic moving in the same direction.

111. B - Reduce traction and greatly increase the risk of hydroplaning and skidding

Bald or worn tires have little tread to grip the road or channel away water. This dramatically increases stopping distance and the risk of hydroplaning and skidding, especially in wet conditions.

112. B - Greatly increase crash risk and may be cited as reckless driving

Aggressive driving dramatically increases the risk of a crash and can lead to reckless driving citations, points, and higher insurance. The time saved is minimal compared to the danger created.

113. B - Counterclockwise; traffic already in the circle has priority

In the United States, traffic in a roundabout flows counterclockwise, and vehicles already circulating in the roundabout have the right of way. Entering drivers must yield and merge into a safe gap.

114. B - Check mirrors and look for approaching traffic and cyclists

Before opening your door into traffic, check your mirrors and look over your shoulder for approaching vehicles and cyclists. 'Dooring' a passing cyclist is dangerous and illegal in many states.

115. B - Driving at higher speeds on a wet road, especially with worn tires

Hydroplaning happens when a layer of water builds between your tires and the road, usually at higher speeds on wet pavement. Worn tires and standing water increase the risk. Slow down in the rain to keep tire contact with the road.

116. B - Move over a lane if safe, or slow down significantly if you cannot

Move Over laws require drivers to change lanes away from stopped emergency and service vehicles when safe. If you cannot move over, slow down well below the speed limit and pass with extreme caution.

117. C - Not drive after consuming any alcohol - use a sober driver, taxi, or rideshare

There is no safe way to drive after drinking. The only sure prevention is to not drive at all after consuming alcohol - arrange a designated sober driver, taxi, or rideshare instead.

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
